




Have you recently been diagnosed with type 2 diabetes?

Would you like to be part of research to help to improve early detection of pancreatic cancer?

SAFE-D is a new clinical study aiming to help improve the early detection of pancreatic cancer.

People diagnosed with diabetes have an increased risk of developing pancreatic cancer, which has no obvious symptoms in the early stages.



If you are aged 50-84 and have been diagnosed with type 2 diabetes within the last 6 months, you may be eligible to take part.

The study involves having a simple blood test which will be analysed in a laboratory.
